VETERAN OF WAR FALLS DEAD AT HIS HOME.

Coroner Pronounces Death of Daniel C. Smith Due To Enlargement of Heart.

The funeral of Daniel C. Smith, Union veteran and former Government shipping cierk, who dropped dead at his home, 934 East Jefferson street, Saturday night, of heart disease, will be held this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at the Port Fulton Methodist church in Jeffersonville, of which he was a devoted member. The services will be conducted by the Rev. Daniel French, the pastor, and the burial will be in Eastern cemetery in that city. The pallbearers will be chosen from among members of the Grand Army of

the Republic.

Mr. Smith was reading the paper at his home Saturday night shortly before 11 o'clock when he was seized with a sudden attack of heart trouble and fell to the ficor dead. Dr. Buckle, the family physician, was called, but before he arrived the aged man had passed away. The Coroner, Dr. Ellis Duncan, was notified and he pronounced death due to enlargement of the heart. The body was removed to Barrett's undertaking establish-ment, where it was prepared for burial and later taken to the family residence. Mr. Smith was born in Artemis, Ky., sixty-four years ago, and came of ploneer Kentucky parents. He enlisted in the Seventh Kentucky Regiment of the Union army at the opening of the war and served until the close of the struggle. For many years he was a shipping clerk in the service of the Government, but owing to ill health he had been unable to work for some time. Besides his wife, to work for some time. Besides his wife, who was Miss Mary Dustin, he is survived by his son, Daniel C. Smith, Jr.,

and four daughters, Mrs. Jennie Hess, Mrs. Charles Wilhelm, Mrs. F. Isert and Miss Edna Smith.
