SERVICES OVER BODY OF THE

John D. Strassburg Will Be Buried This Afternoon In the Eastern Cemetery.

The funeral services of John Dedrick Strassburg, the oldest postal clerk, who died of sentility Monday afternoon at his home, 940 Washington street, will be held this afternoon at 2 o'clock at the residence and at 2:30 o'clock at the German Methodist Episcopal church. The body will be burled in Eastern cemetery.

The pallbearers have been selected as follows: Andrew Edinger, Jacob Edinger, John Stitz, George Stitz, Frank Weber and Edward Peter.

Mr. Strassburg was eighty-eight years old and was the oldest postal elerk in the world. He was born in Hanover, Germany, but at the age of thirteen years he came to America, and after receiving his education in Lawrenceburg, Ind., he removed to Battimore, where he was married. Later he came to Louisville and joined the pos-

tal service when Dr. H. Mosby was postmaster of Louisville, in 1843.
