

no services were held, but the remains of Capt. Schmid were interred with military honors, and with the impressive ceremonies of the Grand Army of the Republic, in Eastern Cemetery. At the grave Mr. Chas. Neumeyer, his old colleague, made a few remarks upon the life of their dead friend and companion, and was followed by Mr. Henry S. Cohn and Gen. Whitaker, who during the war commanded the regiment to which Capt. Schmid was attached. After the addresses the Liederkrantz Society rendered two songs. The body was then laid to rest.

The pall-bearers were Col. R. M. Kelly, Col. John A. Beninger, Maj. August Stein, Capt. George Marker, Lieut. A. Rentlinger and Privates Louis Kammerer, Fritz Monk and Jacou Haag. There were many floral tributes sent to the grave, one of which was a handsome design sent by George H. Thomas Post, G. A. R.

Capt. Schmid was a member of the Sixth Kentucky Volunteers, and received a wound at the battle of Shiloh. By this he was forced to abandon his trade, that of a watchmaker, and he went into journalism, for which his talents were eminently fitted. For a long while he was on the *Volksblatt*, a daily Republican German paper, and upon the death of that paper Capt. Schmid found employment with the *Omnibus*, where he remained until last fall, when his constitution failed him and he retired. His disease was consumption. He leaves a wife and one married daughter.

#### FUNERAL OF CAPT. SCHMID.

Laid to Rest With Military Honors in the Eastern Cemetery.

The funeral of Henry C. Schmid occurred yesterday afternoon, at 2:30 o'clock, from his late residence, No. 1,113 Baxter avenue. At 2 o'clock a number of ex-union soldiers, friends and comrades in arms of Mr. Schmid, assembled at Beck's Hall, where a meeting was held for the purpose of drafting suitable resolutions of respect to their dead comrade. Gen. Whitaker presided and Mr. Henry S. Cohn acted as Secretary. The following resolutions were drawn up and adopted:

It has pleased an all-wise providence to remove from us our late comrade, Capt. Henry C. Schmid, to those unknown shores from whence no wanderer returns. We, his companions, mourn his loss deeply, and be it therefore

*Resolved*, That we have lost in Capt. Henry C. Schmid a brave soldier and friend, and the city of Louisville an upright, honorable citizen.

*Resolved*, That we sympathize with the family of the deceased in their bereavement, and that we hope that time, the healer of all sorrows, will also be instrumental to console them in their unfortunate loss.

*Resolved*, That we attend the funeral in a body, and that these resolutions be sent to the press of Louisville with the request that they be published.
