Schunid was a member of the Sixth Kentucky Volunteers, and received a wound at the battle of Shilob. By this he was forced to abandon his trade, that of a watchmaker, and he went into journalism, for which his talents were eminently fitted. For a long while he was on the Volksblatt, a daily Re-publican German paper. and upon the death of that paper Capt. Schmid found em-ployment with the Omnibus, where he re-mained until last fall, when his constitution failed him and he retired. His disease was consumption. He leaves a wife and one married daughter.
